Scouts will be able to earn up to seven Merit Badges like Engineering, Nuclear Science, Public Health, Safety, Woodwork, Railroading, Traffic Safety, Crime Prevention, Inventing, Family Life, Citizenship in the Nation and World just to name a few. He can earn the World Conservation Award while working on Eagle required merit badges.

The New Merit badge classes have been added to the program including Chess, and Robotics will be available. Wilderness First Aid for 14years and above will be available as well as C.O.P.E Instructor Training for those over 18 years of age.

Other activities planned; Polar Bear Patch camping (temperatures permitting), games like noodle hockey, team building activities, Robot Wars, speed Chess tournament and the Sparky relay. Frequently Asked Question

Will there be showers?

Yes, showers will be available for adults and youth.

Do I need an up to date Medical Form ?

Yes, you need an up-to-date Medical Form found in this packet with an up-to-date physical signed by a Doctor, PA or Nurse Practitioner

Will I need to bring my own tent and bedding?

Yes, You will need to bring your own tent and bedding. Please be prepared for winter weather. A supply list is also included in this packet. This will be a great opportunity to earn your Polar Bear Patch (temperature permitting)

What about food?

All meals will be provided and served in the dining hall.

Will the trading post be opening?

Yes, the trading post will be open and hour will be posted in front of the administration building.

What is the lasted date I can register?

We ask that you please have all session registration forms e-mailed to wintercamp@shawneetrails.org and fees mailed to Shawnee Trails Council (address listed above) by the 20th of December 2011. All orders must be turned in by December 5th.

How many Merit Badges can I earn while at Camp?

You could earn from four to seven merit badge while at camp.

Can an individual Scout attend?

Yes, a lone scout can attend as a **provisional camper**; he will be placed with another Troop.

Will they have any opportunities to earn any of the special Scouting awards?

Yes, they can earn their World Conservation Award, by taking Environmental Science, Soil and Water Conservation and Citizenship of the World.

Winter Camp Merit Badges Classes

Vocational Studies

Composite Material-Composites can be found just about everywhere: they make things stronger and tougher.

Railroading-By earning this badge, Scouts can learn about the history of railroading, its place in modern society, careers in railroading, and hobbies related to railroading.

Genealogy-Discovering your ancestors back through history is what genealogy is all about.

Soil and Water Conservation- It is the duty of every person to learn more about the natural resources on which our lives depend so that we can help make sure that these resources are used intelligently and cared for properly.

Health and Safety

Public Health-The field of public health deals with maintaining and monitoring the health communities. Field trip required.

Safety- Knowing about safety helps Scouts to make the right choices and take the best action to avoid accidents by making informed choices in their everyday activities and to respond appropriately during emergency situations.

Traffic Safety- Earning the Traffic Safety Merit Badge and will give Scouts some crucial tools to stay safer, when driving a car.

Crime Prevention- Preventing crime, which can be as simple as reducing the opportunities for crime

Dentistry- Teeth do a lot more than just peek out from under that winning smile.

Science

Inventing-Explore the world of inventing through this new merit badge and discover your inner inventiveness. Some homework will need to be finished outside of class. 3c.,and 5 will need to be done as homework during camp. Boys may work in teams.

Nuclear Science-Earning the Nuclear Science Merit Badge is a chance for scouts to learn about exciting field at the cutting edge of science today.

Robotics- A new merit badge being offered, that explores the exciting world of robotics.

Engineering- Engineering uses both science and technology to turn ideas into reality, devising all sort of thing we use in everyday life.

Chemistry-Chemistry explores how substances react with each other, how they change, how certain forces connect molecules, and how molecules are made are all parts of chemistry

Arts

Chess- Learn to play Chess.

American Heritage-Learn more about what it means to be an American.

Bugling- the MB Counselor requires that Scouts who sign up have some experience playing trumpet or coronet. Those who have trumpet or bugles are encouraged to bring them (please label) but it is not required. Requirement 6 completed after Camp.

Eagle Required

Citizenship of the Nation – A nation is a patchwork of communities that differ from each other and may be governed differently.

Citizenship of the World- They will learn how good a world citizen each person is depends on his willingness to understand and appreciate the values, traditions, and concerns of people in other countries.

First Aid- Scout will learn what to do when someone is injured.

Family Life-They will learn why it is important to know more about family life and how to strength their family.

Environmental Science-Scouts will get a taste of what it is like to be an environmental scientist, making observations and carrying out experiments to investigate the natural world

Free- time Merit Badge Classes

Cooking-Introduces principles of cooking that can be used either at home or in the outdoors.

Collections-Collecting can be an educational and financially rewarding pastime: a collector must educate himself about a specific subject.

Fire Safety-Scouts will learn to use fire safely.

Geocaching-Learn about new and exciting hobby, present day treasure hunt with a GPS.

Disabilities Awareness- We will see that each person has their own personalities, distinct interests and ideas, different physical features, and different strengths and needs.

Extras

Hunter Safety- Earn your Orange Card and learn the proper way to use a gun, taught by the Ky Fish and Wildlife Hunter Safety Instructor, Bobby McKee.

Wilderness First Aid- For 14years and older, no prior first aid required an additional \$75.00 charge for supplies.

C.O.P.E. Instructor Training- This will be available in the afternoon for anyone interested over the age of 18 years.

Camp Policies

Your cooperation is a must in these areas:

1. Sheath knives are not permitted.
2. Handguns, personal firearms, or archery equipment will not be permitted at camp.
3. Liquid fuels for camp equipment are to be handled by adults only. Liquid fuel containers are to be checked in and stored in our central lock box.
4. Program areas are off limits during non-program hours.
5. No Alcohol or illegal drugs.
6. Smoking is prohibited on camp property.
7. No pets.
8. Visitor must check-in and checkout at the admin building.
9. No bicycles.
10. Generators or trailer campers are prohibited.
11. Vehicles are not allowed in campsites. All cars must be parked in parking lot #1 after unloading gear.

Scout wishing to leave camp for any reason must have a security/release policy signed by his or her parents or guardian before being allowed to leave with anyone.
